### PASTOR'S DEVOTIONAL



"For he is our peace; in his flesh he has made both groups into one and has broken down the dividing wall, that is, the hostility between us." – Ephesians 2:14

Throughout my life I have been involved in rivalries that pitted either the school I was attending or my favourite sports team against our traditional opponent. In high

school, the rivalry between my school, North Plainfield High School, and South Plainfield High School included the climactic Thanksgiving Day game that packed the fields at both schools and defined the success or failure of each school's season. When I went to university, my school had a traditional rivalry with Franklin and Marshall College in Lancaster, Pennsylvania, two schools with similar origins and academic strengths. Being a lifelong fan of the New York Yankees has placed me at the center of debates with Boston Red Sox fans (and more than a few Blue Jays fans!), and as a fan of the New York Giants there are a few teams whose games I watch merely to watch them lose. While I am not fanatical in my support of these teams and schools (I do not go into mourning when the Giants fail to win the Super Bowl), it is a defining aspect of my life story.

You might think that such rivalries would not include Lutheran seminaries, since all these schools exist to train pastors, deacons, and leaders for ministry and service in our church – but there was a bitter rivalry that existed between the two Lutheran seminaries in Pennsylvania for many years. The Lutheran Theological Seminary at Gettysburg is the oldest Lutheran seminary in North America, founded in 1826 by the Rev. Samuel S. Schmucker of the General Synod of the Evangelical Lutheran Church. The seminary campus is located on Seminary Ridge and was at the center of the Battle of Gettysburg during the American Civil War. In 1864, another seminary was founded in Pennsylvania: The Lutheran Theological Seminary at Philadelphia was established by the Rev. Charles Porterfield Krauth of the General Council of

the Lutheran Church. This second seminary was established because the General Council believed that the General Synod was not "Lutheran enough" in its theology. While I will not go into the details here, the two schools remained bitter rivals for many generations of seminarians. As a graduate of the Philadelphia Seminary, I still maintain some animosity towards that "other" seminary, who were our rivals in the annual Luther Bowl football game and in many other areas of church life.

So, you can imagine my surprise when it was announced in 2017 that the two seminaries were merging, to be known as United Lutheran Seminary. The seminary maintains its campuses in Philadelphia and Gettysburg but is now governed by one Board of Directors and led by a president who commutes between the two campuses. At first, I could not imagine how this would work: would the Canadiens merge with the Maple Leafs, or the Giants with the Cowboys? I was even more skeptical when it was announced that the two seminaries' alumni associations were merging into what would be known as The United Lutheran Seminary Alumni Association (TULSAA). I resisted getting involved in this new school and its alumni group (after all, I was a graduate of the Philadelphia Seminary, not this new school!). But two years ago, I received a message from a classmate asking me to consider joining the TULSAA Board. The executive was looking to expand its representation geographically, and since I am one of the few alumni who live in Canada, they felt I was a perfect fit. I accepted this invitation with some trepidation, believing that if it did not work out that I could always step away. But to my surprise and delight, I soon came to know some wonderful people from both schools (as well as ULS), and the experience has made me question my former attitude toward the seminary that I had only looked upon as a rival.

As we rejoice in this Easter season in the glorious resurrection of our Lord Jesus Christ and the blessed hope that is ours through our baptism into Christ's death and resurrection, we are reminded that one of the central messages of the Gospel is reconciliation, that in Christ we are reconciled to God and to one another. Paul speaks of the "dividing all of hostility" (Ephesians 2:14) that Christ has broken down so that there might now be "one new humanity in place of the two, thus making peace." In 2 Corinthians, Paul proclaims that God has "reconciled himself to us through Christ and has given us the ministry of reconciliation" (2 Corinthians 5:18). When Peter reluctantly accepts the invitation of the Roman centurion Cornelius to share the Gospel in his home, it is a transforming moment for the apostle who now proclaims that "I truly understand that God shows no partiality, but in every nation anyone who fears him and does what is right is acceptable to him." (Acts 10:34-35). As the curtain in the Temple was torn in two at the moment of Jesus' death, so has he eliminated all barriers that would separate us from God and to look upon other people as bitter rivals rather than beloved children of God.

As we rejoice in the gift of reconciliation that is ours through the resurrection of our Lord Jesus Christ, this Easter season is a time for us to look at those relationships in our lives that are fractured, at the ways we look upon "other" people who we may see as rivals rather than as beloved children of God. It may be relationships in our personal lives, or relationships with our neighbours; it may be longstanding rivalries that we have inherited, or deep-seated prejudices against people who have been taught to hate and fear. Reconciliation is the will of God who desires that all people should live together in the Beloved Community that is possible when we take seriously Paul's message that "there is no longer Jew or Greek, there is no longer slave or free, there is no longer male and female; for all of you are one in Christ Jesus" (Galatians 3:28).

This month, Susan and I will be traveling to Gettysburg for the spring alumni convocation at United Lutheran Seminary. As I was making plans for this trip, I caught myself telling a friend that we were going to "my seminary" – something I never would have said about this school that was the "other seminary" for all my life. As the reconciliation between two Lutheran seminaries has been a blessing to many, may we experience the blessing of reconciliation that is ours through the resurrection of our Lord Jesus Christ, he who is "Lord of all."

#### **CHURCH OFFERINGS**



As we are all aware, there are many different ways in which we as members make our offerings to our church. The traditional way for many years was an Offering Envelope and of course, this method continues to be used today. For the last several years, the option of Pre-Authorized Remittance (PAR) has been offered to our members along with e-transfer as well as making your offerings on our church website.

We as a congregation have been well served by the members who have decided to make their offerings via the Pre-Authorized Remittance (PAR), however, it would be more beneficial, if we had more members using this method. Currently, we receive monthly PAR offerings from 53 households. In 2023 PAR offerings accounted for approximately 40% of our overall offerings. The best way this method of offering can be summed up is that it provides our church with a steady and predictable revenue stream to fund our ministry and mission.

To combat the inflationary increases we are being subjected to as far as our expenses, we are asking at this time, for our members to prayerfully consider increasing the amount of your offering in 2024 to coincide with these inflationary increases. This request is being asked of our members that choose either the Envelope, PAR or any other option. In addition, if you have never considered changing your method of offering to the Pre-Authorized Remittance (PAR), we really would appreciate you considering this option. The Envelope method has become increasingly more costly for our church, due to the increased costs associated with the boxes of envelopes. From a fee point of view, the charges under the PAR program are definitely more economical. To make this change or to increase the amount of your monthly offering using the PAR option, all you will need to do is to contact Jane Kelly, our Parish Administrator, and she will step through the procedure with you.

Whatever method you choose to make your offering, we do respect your decision. We just wanted to make you aware of our thoughts in this regard as it relates to the Finance Committee, who oversee the finances of our church.

ROTARY HOSPICE has a volunteer that makes lightly scented candles using tea cups and saucers which hold the wax. They are looking for donations of tea cups and saucers to use in the making of these candles. If you are house cleaning, downsizing or cleaning out your china cabinet and have some that you can donate they would be greatly appreciated. For drop offs: Rotary Hospice is staffed 24/7 so teacups and saucers can be dropped off anytime. Their address is 80 Greenwood Drive. They are located behind Greenwood Court (you have to pull in their driveway at 90 Greenwood and follow it all the way around back to find them). Ring the intercom at the front door and leave the teacups and saucers with reception.

The *CUPPA CANDLES* are for sale at reception but they are also incorporated into their "*Care Bundles*". A "*Care Bundle*" is given to family after their loved one has died, as they are leaving the hospice. The bundle also includes information

from their social workers on grief and bereavement and resources to support this next step of their journey.
